"Thoughts on Passing On"

1 st Thessalonians 4:13-14 — "But we do not want you to be uninformed, brethren, about those who are asleep, so that you will not grieve as do the rest who have no hope. For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so God will bring with Him those who have fallen asleep in Jesus."

It wasn't that long ago in the past where I got the call from my mother. "Jake, if you want to see your grandfather one last time, you better get down here now." I had just entered my second year as pastor at our two churches, and I had a lot to do, but nothing was more important than making the drive to see my grandfather down in Madison. My grandpa Tom had just been moved to hospice. Six weeks earlier they had given him six months to live with an aggressive form of cancer. We knew it wasn't going to be long, so we had been down to see him only a few days prior. Such as it often is in life, we had much less time to be around my grandpa than we thought. So, with the blessing of the church elders, the church secretary, and my wonderful wife, I drove home, packed a bag, and immediately began the nearly four-hour drive to go see my grandpa. He already was so sick that he couldn't speak by the time I arrived. The man I had grown up listening to story after amazing story from, who had been a part of teaching me how to hunt, who had influenced me in loving baseball and fishing and lifting, was now quiet and small on his hospice bed. Many of my uncles and aunts were able to come and say goodbye, as were some of the grandchildren like myself.

The entire time grandma never left his side, and neither did my mother, and neither did I. It was some of the hardest hours of my life, but it was also so fulfilling. All of us who were there, including my grandfather, knew Christ. So we did what Christians do. We prayed, we shared memories, we held grandpa's hand and told him the truth that it was ok for him to go home. We told him that we loved him. The benediction that we end every service with from the book of Numbers hits differently in hours like this. (May the Lord bless you and keep you, may the Lord make His face shine upon you and be gracious unto you, may He lift His countenance upon you, and grant you peace, may you go in peace, Amen.) The reality of these situations forces us to know that we are mortal, but it also gives us who are Christ's great hope in what is to come. The three of us were there the full evening, and when we went to go to sleep, the moment the lights went out in his room, he passed and went home to Jesus. No doubt you who are reading this have been through the agonies of death in similar fashion. Whether death comes expectedly in old age, or unexpectedly far too soon, it always hurts. But, Beloved, we have hope.

Both Rhianna and I have had the privilege to be by the side of many as they approach the end. I asked my lovely wife what observations she had made about the folks she worked with in the nursing home as they moved towards their last moments. She said some were ready, some were afraid, some were at peace, many were confused, some joked their way through it while others sat quiet and serious. Some had plans for their funerals and afterwards, having prepared ahead of time, while some were caught completely by surprise that their day actually came. Her observations mirrored my own. Everyone approaches their earthly end differently. While it is never easy, thankfully, for the Christian there is that hope to be had. Many believers, if their minds are still fully functioning near the end, find themselves in a completely different place. Many are not afraid.

The other day my father asked if I had ever in my time met someone who was unafraid, truly unafraid, when they got the news that they were going to pass. The answer, fantastically, is yes. Flo Holderness, Marlys Delzer, Don Scheller, Marlene Wordleman, and Fred Spading are just five of the many names that come to mind, where in their old age they were ready to go. They were given peace that goes beyond all human understanding, and they each spoke openly of the hope they had in what was to come on the other side. For those of you looking ahead to the future, wondering about your own death, take solace in the fact that the God who made you and died for you also doesn't leave you alone as you approach glory. He gives that peace to those who ask of it, to those who know Him. Yes, the moment is still mournful, but there is a hope that comes behind it. Those are the "easy" (if there is such a thing) deaths. We would expect those who have had a full life who have walked with Jesus to end their trek well and be at peace. We all hope to end our race like those saints listed above. But what about those who go too soon?

The harder funerals, the harder deaths, were for those who passed without warning and far before their eightieth birthdays. What does God provide for His people there? The three hardest funerals (amongst many difficult ones) I have ever performed were for Shelly Germundson, when she unexpectedly passed in late 2021, for Blaine Delzer, when he unexpectedly passed in early 2021, and for my own grandfather Allan after his short bout with cancer in 2018. There is no greater honor than being asked to perform funerals like this for a loved one, but boy oh boy are they hard. There is nothing worse in this life than for a parent to bury their own child, and no child should have to bury their parent when they are in their twenties. Nobody should have to watch their loved ones wither quickly, and see their loved ones' hopes for the future dashed in an instant. What does God provide for His people in those tragedies? What hope is there? First and foremost, it is important to recognize that it is ok to mourn at any loss, but especially losses like those. The passing of loved ones creates a wound that we never really get over in this life, but we make space for over time. When those loved ones are objectively followers of Christ like we are, there is much solace to be had in knowing where they go. Jesus speaks in Revelation very clearly that in heaven there is no crying, mourning, pain, tears or death, the former things have passed away. So, what is the hardest of days for us here, is the greatest of days for them as they enter God's presence in heaven. There is further hope to be had in the reading listed above from Thessalonians, where the Apostle Paul reminds the church that we will see those who have died in Christ once again. As I have preached at many funerals, it is good to mourn for a time over our loss... but the one who has passed and is in heaven would not wish us to mourn forever. Rather, they would have us remember them fondly and rejoice together, continuing to live as God has called us to live. They unequivocally would also tell us to put our faith in Christ, so that we too may receive that wonderful reward of eternal salvation.

Beloved, there is so much more to say on death (and life) as a Christian, but for the sake of brevity I'll conclude this newsletter article with a call for prayers just as we have been commanded. Prayers for peace, prayers for encouragement and hope, prayers for a quiet and easy move from this life to the next, prayers for perseverance and hope when our time comes, all of these are good. God answers all prayer, (although maybe not always exactly how we wish) and He most definitely answers these prayers by giving us what we need. Beloved, death is a part of life in our world. Until Christ comes back or until we are released from this mortal coil, we experience the joys of life and the sorrows of death. Death is not the end, but is the beginning for those of us who follow Christ. We have that which the world cannot understand... peace in death, for we know that eternal life has been granted to us.

I hope and pray that this little article of ramblings on the ending of life encourages you Beloved. If you find yourself wishing to talk about this further, know that my door is always open and my phone is always on. Many prayers for you, take courage and hope, and fear not. As Jesus proclaims in John 16:33 "These things I have spoken to you, so that in Me you may have peace. In the world you have tribulation, but take courage; I have overcome the world."

Did You Know?

The church has an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) located to the right of the glass History case on the wall.

This is a piece of medical equipment that is used in emergency situations for suspected cardiac arrest before First Responders arrive.

This equipment may be used by anyone

WITHOUT medical training. We encourage you

to take a look at this. Open the case, turn

it on and you will hear verbal directions on

what to do.

This is something you should be familiar with if you are in a group that meets or holds a public fundraiser at the church, or if you are just curious to learn about it. You can ask Louise Anderson or anyone with medical training for help with this device.

These shawls are located in the Friendship Hall to the left of the glass History case.


